Sunday Morning Outdoor Worship

Starting **Sunday**, **September 13**, we will be worshipping together, in-person, hopefully under a large tent in our parking lot. The service will start at **11:00 am**. This later time will increase the odds of us having decent temperatures outside as we move into the fall. Starting at **11:00 am** will also allow me as pastor to be fully present with our virtual community for our live stream of worship on Facebook at 9:30 am. Everything that we are doing online with Facebook and YouTube will continue as it has.

Masks will still be worn by those gathered, and 6' physically distancing is strongly encouraged. Simply bring your own lawn chairs. Spots will be marked on the pavement to give you a general sense of what a safe distance might be. We are limited at this time to 100 people, but this means that when capacity is reached in the tent, you can set up chairs outside the tent, under your own, or stay in your car and tune to 102.3 FM.

Our service in the parking lot will include Holy Communion. Prefilled cups and wafers will be distributed by a deacon of the day or communion assistant wearing gloves. They will place them in your hands so that there will be no contact. An usher or other assistant will have printed copies of the bulletin to also place in your hands (if you haven't already downloaded it). The lyrics for the songs will be printed, and we encourage you to hum or sing quietly along in your masks. And there will be more instructions on Sunday mornings.

Until then, drive-in worship as we have been doing, will happen on Saturdays it will happen twice more, on 8/29 and 9/5 at 4:30. Please come and fellowship with your community of faith IN PERSON.

Book Study

Our next book for our Racial justice book study on Wednesday evenings at 6:30, via Zoom, will be the book *So you want to talk about race* by Ijeoma Oluo (Seal Press, 2019). The book is widely available. I bought a copy from Target for less than ten dollars. I am sure that Shuler Books will have copies available, or just about wherever you buy your books. The book is written in a conversational style that will help us answer the difficult questions as we continue to develop our antiracist selves. We will look at questions such as, 'What is Racism?', 'Is police brutality really about race?', 'What is the school-to-prison pipeline?', 'Why can't I say the 'N' word?', and much, much more (including planning for practical steps that we can all take).



The study will begin Wednesday, September 16 at 6:30 pm. Please email me if you would like to join the study at pastormattsmith@gmail.com so that you can be included in the Zoom invite on Wednesdays.

Sharing the blessings we receive

Lutheran Church Endowment Fund

We have not been talking consistently about finances recently and it is something that we need to keep close to our hearts and thoughts. There has been a lot going on behind the scenes during the past few months to keep Bethlehem functioning, but it is also very important to communicate the on-going financial state of the church.

In April we reported that Council had authorized our application for the Payroll Protection Plan funding from the federal government. We were approved for a forgivable loan in the amount of \$38,700.00. These funds were allocated and used for payroll, utilities, and Pastor Matt's health care and pension contributions. Since we are utilizing the funds in compliance with the federal guidelines, we will not have to repay the loan. The decision to utilize the program was a proactive approach to make sure that Bethlehem could keep staff employed and paid. In addition, the program allowed us to maintain reserves in saving's and CD's.

The regular offerings have been fairly consistent and the following provides a comparison year over year from 2019 to 2020:

2019 average monthly offerings---\$28,438.57 2020 average monthly offerings---\$24,313.02 Decrease of \$4,125.55/month

With regards to the overall financial position, the actual deficit as it relates to operating income and expense is currently \$22,184.17. Through the end of July we had also reduced our set-aside for dedicated accounts by \$8,117.88. Looking at the Balance Sheet, our cash reserves have been reduced by \$30,335.59, but this is more than offset by the PPP funding. The net effect is an increase in our cash position of \$8,397.95. It should be noted that since we are not meeting in-person for worship and other activities, we are not spending many of the line items in the budget. Certain things that we would normally expense are not happening and that is what is helping the deficit remain low during this time. It should also be noted that as we begin to open to activities, we will have additional expenses as a result of the pandemic. Our Treasurer, Vicki Leighton is monitoring the financial situation very closely in conjunction with the Board of Stewardship and Finance.

Through your continued giving and generosity to Bethlehem, the church is in a solid financial position.

- We will have a "God's Work, Our Hands" event immediately following Sunday worship. Looking forward to seeing some of you as we show our commitment to the neighborhood.

BELC/Building News:

- The Board of Buildings and Grounds has secured a contract with Boling Janitorial Service, Inc. We are currently month-to-month, and will continue as long as building use is low. There are plusses and minuses to having an outside service rather than a custodian we employ. We are evaluating as we move forward, and will make decisions as they present, keeping the safety of our congregation, and the maintenance of the facility as our first priorities. - The triennial Mission Home inspection went well. Other than a furnace inspection, which will be completed when the guys are here installing the new boiler, the called for repairs are minor in nature. We should be able to offer a housing option for Samaritas for many years to come.
- The boiler work is still pending! We have a commitment date of September 2nd. We will have heat before we need it.
- Sanitization supplies are coming! We have started to receive boxes of sanitizer, dispensing stations, and stands. While some items are on back-order, it is exciting to feel like we are making forward progress. Some of these will be utilized for outdoor worship services. Some will allow us to move toward opening the building. Baby steps in the right direction.

"God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble." ~ Psalm 46:1

Dear Friends,

By definition, a refuge is a safe place. When the Bible describes God as our refuge, it is saying that God is our safe place when we need protection from something. Knowing God is our refuge enables us to trust Him more freely. We need not fear situations or people who threaten our well-being, whether in a physical or spiritual sense. There is no situation we will ever face that is out of God's control, so the best place to be, always, is right with Him.

As this pandemic has now continued far longer than any of us could have imagined, maybe we are looking at the church building itself as our refuge. We have often said throughout this time that the church is really the people and not the building. And we know that the church exists wherever two or three are gathered in Christ's name, but the longer we are away from the building we call our church home, the more we want to be able to be inside it. It is a place that holds so many memories and so much promise for the future.

If there was ever a time for us to come together as a church family, it is now. We cannot wish our way out of this situation, but we can pray for things to get better. We are all lonesome and restless, but we must keep our minds on each other and not about just what we think we need individually. We are stronger together in spirit than if we think about things on a personal level. We know that there is a very strong desire to resume activities in the church for small groups, even though we are a long way from resuming in-person worship services. There has been a growing desire by small groups within and outside of the church to be allowed to be able to meet in the building. Our Congregation Council has to honor and balance those requests while staying true to the safeguards of our Re-opening Plan (approved unanimously by the Council). A policy draft was written and approved unanimously as well by the Council in April that stated everything that will need to be done to allow small groups to meet. The fact is that we have not gotten to that point with regards to sanitization chemicals and equipment, as well as training and sanitization protocols. There is a national backorder on many of the items we are purchasing, not because we did not order them soon enough, but because every business, school, and church in the world needs the same items. Church leadership and Council have been proactive from the beginning of the pandemic to make sure we would be ready to re-open Bethlehem as soon as safely possible. We are not at that point and it looks as though it will be some time before that hopeful day arrives.

This time we are going through is frustrating to everyone on many levels and the most important thing we can do is to remain unified as a church family and not let individual wants lead to a fragmented congregation. Last month, Council provided the contact information for each council member. We included that information in the last update to the congregation so everyone could have a voice and contact the person they felt most comfortable with to ask questions, voice concerns, offer opinions and solutions, or just to talk. We are including that information again, below, because we do want to hear from you. Church leadership and Council can and will answer every question that is posed because we have done the due diligence to be prepared with everyone's health and safety the number one priority. All the precautions we are taking and policy we have drafted is done out of love for the congregation. We are not working out of fear and anxiety. We are working based on science and the best research we have available to us.

"When anxiety was great within me, your consolation brought joy to my soul." (Psalm 94:19)

What this Psalm tells us is that even in rough or desperate situations, we can be filled with the joy of the Lord. He is our consolation and His Word eases anxiety like nothing else can. God can bring joy to your soul even during times when you're most anxious by simply knowing that He's present and trusting in His power.

These are anxious, challenging times. We all want to resume our normal lives and our patience is being tested. We need to take a breath occasionally and remember that we are not in this alone. We have God and we have each other, even though we can't meet inside the church building yet. This cannot last forever, but until it is gone, we must remain vigilant and do what is right for each other's health and safety. We will worship together again, but it won't be on our timeline.

As we 'gather' together virtually around the Word and physically distance around the Sacrament, Bethlehem will persevere and come out on the other side of this a stronger church as we stay united in the goal.


