Drive-in Worship

At 4:30 pm on the Saturdays in August we will have Drive-In Worship in our parking lot. You will simply drive in, park, and tune your car stereos to the FM frequency of our broad cast. You may also bring your lawn chairs and sit outside your vehicles, at a safe distance from others.

The service will include music, prayer, scripture reading, a preview of Sunday's message, AND COMMUNION. To join us in communion we ask that you bring your own elements (wine or grape juice and bread of some kind). When the pastor prays the Words of Institution (On the night in which he was betrayed...) you will lift your bread and cup at the same time.

I know I keep saying this, but I want everyone to know, this will in no way replace what we are doing, recording our Sunday Worship, live streaming it on Facebook, and making it available on YouTube. This is just a way for us to safely see one another as the gathered Body of Christ. The community that can form in this way is another sign of how God does great things beyond understanding and marvelous things without number (Job 9:10).

Waking Up White

This book study has been on Zoom at 6:30 on Wednesday evenings. The study is going well. We have two sessions left as of today. People have begun asking, "What's next?" Two books that I am looking at for us to work through next are *White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism* by Robin DiAngelo (Beacon Press 2018, or *How to Be an Antiracist* by Ibram X. Kendi (One World 2019).

I am leaning toward the second book, because it *seems* like it may be a book that will guide us to action. As Kendi says, "simply not being racist isn't enough." I know that we are all anxious to do things that will make a difference. I know I am, but I believe much of the work in becoming antiracist is internal work. It is about having our eyes opened to understand how our whiteness has gotten in the way for so many people. It is about embracing and loving who we are, so that we can love, embrace, and celebrate others.

Doing the work of antiracism is about scattering seed. Even if it is *just* a book study, it will sprout and grow. We may not even know how. It seems like the earth produces of itself, but it is God who grants the growth.

Communion by Appointment

If you are not able to join us for drive-in worship, or you would like to receive the sacrament in a more traditional way, Pastor John and I are available. We will meet you at the church, wearing masks. After prayer, scripture, and a brief communion liturgy, we will share Christ's Body and Blood with a pre-packaged wafer and wine or grape juice on the altar. I have truly appreciated being able to share the sacrament with people in this way.

God of wonder help us to accept that your mysterious ways may never be understood by us, but that your plans are always the best and wisest choices. We surrender to the brilliant adventure that is our life in you.

Dear Friends of Bethlehem,

Pastor Matt's sermon "Asleep at the Wheel" on Sunday, July 19th was very timely for me as I was getting my thoughts together for this newsletter message. Church leadership has been so deeply involved in policy and protocol planning for the future re-opening of our church building that it made me wonder if we are asleep at the wheel. Actually, it made me think that I was asleep at the wheel, so I don't cast a shadow on everyone else. During the past four months, it now seems to me that the entire focus has been on how and when we can safely open the doors of Bethlehem and resume in-person worship services. That certainly was the most important work to do because it is what we all want, so it was the correct priority and very well thought out. It is just not the right time.

After attending our last Council call and listening to that sermon, I feel that our priorities need to change because it is clear we are further away from re-opening Bethlehem than we were just a couple of weeks ago. Based on current events, I think we can all agree that the pandemic is moving in the wrong direction and will keep us apart longer. Our most important work now is not to focus on the church being closed, but on the continued mission work and opportunities that are available to us as we focus on the future. The truth is that the church has never closed. While it is true that it is not functioning with non-stop activities, meetings and worship, it is still functioning internally with our staff doing the great work they do for us. Food Bank volunteers are still filling orders for those in need every week. The Food Bank continues to thrive as maybe the longest running outreach program Bethlehem undertakes and the need will only grow. We are still supporting our mission partners at Pine Ridge whose generous contributions continue to change lives for the better. We own the Mission Home that sometimes gets overlooked even though it is sitting right in front of us and has enhanced the lives of all that have passed through its door. Our faithful and generous members are still making sure their offerings get to the church via the mail, Simply Giving, dropping them off, or using the digital offering link on our website. Most of the boards are meeting regularly to stay connected with some able to accomplish more than others based on their respective responsibilities. As we have reported previously, Council remains very active in maintaining the on-going decision making that must be done regarding all aspects of the church. Our live-stream worship services are replete with music from our choir, Praise Team, youth, organist and soloist's aided by dedicated and talented technology assistance. None of these things are easy in this uncertain time, but guess what? We are still accomplishing much and all of it is good.

Things are very different and none of us know how close we will ever be to what things used to be like. The old saying "we never did it like that before" or, "we tried that once and it didn't work" are now truly obsolete. We are doing things now in a way that none of us could have ever imagined. People serving on boards with little technology capabilities are now calling in to Zoom meetings on a regular basis. Though we are in our respective homes, we can at least see and hear each other for the meeting. It is wonderful to see the faces we miss and connect them to the voice we all know. We are able to have discussions regarding the best interests of Bethlehem and its members even though we are not in the same room. We are finding a way to make it work and we will continue to for as long as it takes.

Pastor Matt has challenged us to think "out of the box" with regards to how we can recreate ourselves and our ministry during this time. It is also critical to reach out and maintain connectivity to our membership. This is a time to think about how each of us can contribute to our on-going mission in a different way. While there are boards, Council and other groups that seemingly appear to be the functioning entities of the church, the most important group of all is us collectively. We are truly the ones that make things happen. Leadership is important from a visionary standpoint, but there is no way anything happens unless we all believe in the same vision and pull together to make it happen. That is how everything at Bethlehem happens and it is more important now than it ever has been.

- August has five Sundays, so Bethlehem again has a chance to positively impact the lives of Lansing School District students who are BELC members or live in the Baker Neighborhood. We have partnered with Lansing SAVE since early 2019 and your generosity continues to affirm and encourage students to strive for a future that holds options for continued education.

- Partnering with the Lansing School District, the YMCA is serving free meals to our community from the BELC parking lot, Monday through Friday. The partnership with the Lansing School District will continue as it has distributing lunches in our parking lot weekday mornings. According to their website, the YMCA distributed 110,057 meals (from all locations) between March 16 and July 18, 2020. - Potter Park Zoo Passes: To comply with CDC guidelines Potter Park Zoo has implemented a system where only a certain number of people can come in at one time. When using a zoo pass you will have to take the chance that they may be at capacity when you arrive. Please take your Potter Park Zoo pass to the admission booth and show it to the zoo employee. If all of the time slots are full they will ask that you wait for the next available time slot, when you and your household will be admitted into the zoo for free. The only way to guarantee access into the zoo at a certain time is by purchasing tickets online but this makes your zoo pass invalid (you cannot buy tickets online and then show admissions your zoo pass to get a refund). Thank you for your cooperation during this time."

BELC/Building News:

- Considering the volume and quality of custodian applicants, the Board of Buildings and Grounds is exploring other options as we move through the rest of the summer and into early fall. Several bids have been received from custodial firms, and the Board is reviewing those. Fortunately, the custodial needs are reduced at this time, so they should be able to come up with a great interim solution. - The boiler project has only progressed as far as delivery of the new unit. Labor has not begun due to the heat our summer has produced. Air conditioning needs are apparently more pressing now than anticipated, so installation has been delayed. We will have heat when we need it, regardless, but the work will surely be accomplished before the temperature drops too low.
- The Board recently conducted a walk-thru inspection of the Mission Home. This is the first of the inspections scheduled to occur twice yearly. It also precedes the triennial rental inspection required by the City of Lansing. The board members noted a few minor repairs, i.e. bad window screens, a cracked window, loose handrail, etc. They have been seen to and the inspection is scheduled for mid-August.

Bethlehem Wants/Needs/Encourages You

When the COVID pandemic started, council decided to postpone the normal election process until we could meet as a congregation. As things have progressed, we have discovered that we will likely not be able to meet again as a congregation for an indeterminate and potentially long time.

Call the appropriate contact person listed below to indicate your interest, or to further clarify the board's role. The first order of business as the boards reconvene is to align the missions and ministries of the boards to our new reality. This is an exciting time in which we can build on our strengths and traditions while finding new ways to accomplish our work and worship. Good, level heads, outside the box thinkers, and people steeped in, but not mired in tradition with a commitment to our church are needed. Open hearts and minds coming together to move our church forward are needed. We need all of us who love and trust God and who believe in the work, ministry, history, and future of our church to listen to and follow God's call.

I realize that ideally, we would seek nominations and input from members, approach individuals in person, hold elections, etc. We are in less than ideal times, so while not seeking to circumvent the system, we do need to keep the wheels turning in an intentional way. Additionally, board meetings have always been open to anyone who has an interest; and boards have always been allowed and encouraged to seek help from other members.

So, in this unprecedented time, we are calling for unprecedented action. If you have a passion for hospitality, please explore the Board of Congregational Care. If you have a passion for evangelism, Outreach. If you have a passion for leadership, perhaps look to a council position (also Board-related), or to a position as board chair. Since we cannot hold elections, these would be unofficial positions that could be affirmed at a later time.
